Sports premium funding report

PE and Sport Premium was introduced in 2013 and its funding is received annually, including academies. Sport Premium (SP) is additional to main school funding and is used by school in a variety of ways to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sporting opportunities.

The following report provides a summary of how Sport Premium has been allocated for the academic year 2020/21 and the impact it is providing for pupils.
