Sports premium funding report

PE and Sport Premium was introduced in 2013 and its funding is received annually, including academies. Sport Premium (SP) is additional to main school funding and is used by school in a variety of ways to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sporting opportunities.

The following report provides a summary of how Sport Premium has been allocated for the academic year 2022/23 and the impact it is providing for pupils.

Key achievements to date until July 2023:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:		
 Awarded Gold Schools Games award for 22/23 Orienteering trail utilised more and incorporated into other areas of the curriculum eg: geography and English. The sports leader met on various occasions and carried out a small PE equipment audit. They chose and ordered playground equipment for KS1 and KS2 break times and designed posters for the schools games values. Assessments – termly and end of year. Bikeability for years Rec, 1,2 and 6 was very successful and is booked again for next year. Achieving better in competitive competitions. More opportunities for SEND groups to take part in festivals and competitions against other schools. Martial Arts Coaching – Year 3 Rugby and Lacrosse Coach. Year 4, 5 and 6. Use of TA and the monitoring of clubs and competitions. Links with PSHE and Mental health and well-being. Swimming at Rochdale leisure centre. Sports day. PE stars of the week. Outdoor maths training for teachers. Took part in our first Watergrove trust competition. Sports coach working across whole school. Children being selected to compete for Greater Manchester in cross country. Participation in IPLCN events. Yes, some children within Year 5 who were not above national level were sent with Year 4 classes as part of catch up sessions.

58% of children achieved the national curriculum aims for swimming.
